

# Gear up!

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#### **TAGA £1695**

The Taga is a cleverly engineered trike that converts into a stroller. In either format it can carry a child from six months old. It's built from oversized aluminium tubes and uses 16" wheels all round: the rear has a Shimano Nexus 3-speed hub. The front disk brakes and rear roller brake were very effective at stopping the trike even fully loaded. On the road the Taga turns heads, but inquirers were shocked by the price.

To convert the Taga from trike to stroller, you remove the child seat and then flip the back wheel over so that it becomes the front wheel (see www.taga.nl/taga-video.asp). It takes about 20 seconds. While it

does separate into two parts to fit into a car boot, the 20-29kg weight (depending on the configuration) means it's heavy to lift.

As I struggled to fit the 73cm wide Taga through my front door, I wondered what problem it solved. I seldom need a push-chair at the end of a cycle journey. And when I did convert it to a stroller – which I took on the London underground - the sheer size made it awkward. Also, child trailers from Burley (from £500) and Chariot (from £600) convert to strollers and attach to any bike. #### SCHWALBE MARATHON EXTREME £38.99 EACH



Schwalbe's Marathon XR tyres have long been an expeditionist's favourite for mixed surface tours, thanks to their rugged build and almost wear-free tread. From the same family, the Extremes are effectively a lighter version (650g for the 2.25in) with wider, deeper lugs better suited to loose gravel and dirt roads. Saving a couple of hundred grams apiece, they're noticeably livelier when riding unladen, making them ideal for tours where you're stopping to mountain bike along the way. This does come at the cost of longevity. My set has had around 4,500km of hard use - much of which has been fully laden and off-road - and the tread is



showing significant signs of wear at the rear, with a cut in one of the lugs. Still, they should be good for a few thousand kilometres more yet, and the sidewalls are holding out well despite riding with heavy loads. Grip is noticeably better than the XRs though they roll a little slower on road. Running an XR at the back and an Extreme at the front could be the ideal compromise for long distance tours along loose, gravel highways, as you'd find in South America and Asia. #### SCHMIDT EDELUX LED HEADLAMP

I use this high-power lamp with a Schmidt 20R dynohub, which I bought ready-built into wheel from St John Street Cycles. The light output is far superior to my previous Schmidt BiSy(E6) lamp. I can now confidently exceed 30mph on unlit roads. On my daily commute cars at junctions will wait rather than pulling out when they see this bright lamp coming towards them

I use the lamp 'senso' mode so it is always on except in bright sunshine, giving rise to shouts of 'You've left your light on, mate!' It comes with a standlight, which charges up with the first spin of the wheel and gives good light when stationary. It has a recessed spade connector for a rear lamp; I use it with a rear mudguardmounted B&M Senso Plus light, which also comes on automatically. The complete package is so unobtrusive that it lives permanently on my winter bike. Incidentally, the lamp bracket is a home-made one.

#### NATIONAL CYCLE NETWORK MEMORY MAP

£20 + £1.50 P&P

The package is a Memory Map overlay comprising the hundreds of track fragments that make up the 12,000 miles of Sustrans' National Cycle Network, along with the digital OS 1:250,000 Road Map of Great Britain. The NCN tracks are shown in green (traffic-free) and red (on road). Hovering over a track with your mouse gives more information, such as distance and an elevation profile. As the tracks are more detailed than the 1:250,000 map supplied, they are best used with more detailed GPS software, or within Memory Map with the OS 1:50,000 Landranger series. For cyclists interested in riding the NCN, who already have detailed maps (ideally digital - but you could copy routes onto paper maps), this is a very useful package.

I needed a lightweight 2-person tent that packed small for a sponsored tandem ride with my nine-year-old stepdaughter. I found this 2kg tent at Decathlon. It's easy to pitch, the porch is big enough for a couple of panniers and ventilation is good. Space is conservative but quality seems fine. I am very impressed. #### WHITE BOX STOVE

So called because of the box it comes in, this meths stove weighs just 29g. Sit the stove on the foil heat reflector, wrap round the wind shield and after about a minute of priming the stove boils 500ml of water in around 7 minutes. One fill of meths (75ml) will burn for about 20 minutes - enough to cook a simple meal for three and



make cups of tea. The stove is made in the US from a recycled aluminium beer bottle. It has no moving parts so is tough as well as light. See www.backpackinglight.co.uk/ product230.asp. CTC member Steve Rowley
